After two years of planning and analysis, The State Chamber used its annual State of Business Forum in November to unveil a long-term strategic framework to strengthen the state’s economic future—Oklahoma Competes. The initiative is grounded in a comprehensive analysis of Oklahoma’s economic performance conducted by Ted Abernathy, a national business data expert. The data showed Oklahoma trailing national and regional peers across key indicators, including education/workforce outcomes, health rankings, advanced industry job growth, and long-term GDP growth.

State Chamber President and CEO Chad Warmington emphasized that Oklahoma’s challenges are not rooted in a lack of resources, but in long-standing complacency. Oklahoma Competes provides a data-driven framework for measurable progress across four fundamentals of competitiveness: economic climate, education and workforce, infrastructure, and innovation and entrepreneurship. While the state remains competitive in cost structure and infrastructure, the strategy calls for focused policy reforms to strengthen education outcomes, workforce pipelines, and the innovation ecosystem needed to attract higher-value jobs and sustain growth.

Developed by the State Chamber Research Foundation in partnership with Economic Leadership, Oklahoma Competes is intended to foster a lasting culture of competitiveness. State Chamber leaders underscored that using data to guide policy decisions will help ensure investments deliver long-term benefits for Oklahomans. The initiative aims to create an enduring plan that improves quality of life, supports future generations, and positions Oklahoma to compete successfully on the national and global stage.





# 2300 CLUB



The State Chamber's political wing, the 2300 Club, continued to keep members informed on key political intelligence and emerging trends in 2025. Political strategist David Polyansky shared insights on the evolving state of party politics at the national level, while members also looked ahead to the future in November as Chris Wilson, CEO of EyesOver US, offered an inside look at how emerging AI tools are reshaping political campaigns, voter outreach, and strategy.

The State Chamber's PAC grew its donor base this year with support and engagement from members across industries. Helping members understand the importance of contributing annually to the business community's PAC was a high priority for our team this year. We increased our donors by over 30%, which will allow for stronger engagement in the 2026 election cycle!

## Landmark Session for Oklahoma's Business Community

As part of our effort to make Oklahoma the best place to do business, significant progress was made in 2025 through the Chamber's Annual Agenda. Reforms to Oklahoma's legal environment, steps to strengthen workforce pipelines, and improvements to the state's overall tax competitiveness each moved the state closer to becoming the best place to start, run, and grow a business.

The agenda saw overwhelming success because of the support and hard work from our legislative champions. A big thanks to the legislators that tackled the tough issues to move Oklahoma forward.



### WORKFORCE

**SB 95** (Effective date: 11/1/2025)

Clarifies that an unpaid intern is not within the definition of "employee" under the Oklahoma Workers' Compensation Act. ✓

**SB 662 & 663** (Effective date: 8/29/2025)  
Sen. Adam Pugh & Rep. Brian Hill

Together, these bills ensure that the Workforce Commission has the authority and funding to implement programming related to workforce development needs of the State. ✓

**SB 711** (Effective date: 7/1/2025)  
Sen. Adam Pugh & Rep. Ronny Johns

Removes chronic absenteeism from the school district's report card mandated by the Every Student Succeeds Act and replaces it with a school climate survey. ✓

### LEGAL REFORM

**SB 642** (Effective date: 5/27/2025)  
Sen. Lonnie Paxton & Rep. Kyle Hilbert

Protects an employers right to contract and enforcement of an indemnity agreement for claims arising under an injury covered by Workers' Compensation. ✓

**SB 453** (Effective date: 9/1/2025)  
Rep. Erick Harris & Sen. Brent Howard

Creates the Oklahoma Expedited Actions Act, which allows for cases only seeking \$250,000 or less to go to court with modified, expedited rules. The bill also includes a cap on noneconomic damages, set at \$500,000 for non-severe and non-permanent injuries, \$1 million for permanent mental injury, and no cap for severe and permanent injuries. ✓

**HB 2619** (Effective date: 11/1/2025)  
Rep. Erick Harris & Sen. Brent Howard

Requires parties to a lawsuit to disclose commercial third-party litigation funding agreements. ✓

### TAXES

**SB 324** (Effective date: 8/29/2025)  
Sen. Kristen Thompson & Rep. Brian Hill

Creates the Oklahoma Research and Development Rebate fund for qualifying research expenditures. ✓

The new Prosperity Tracker Legislative Scorecard grades each legislator's voting record on business-related legislation.

## TORT STUDY★



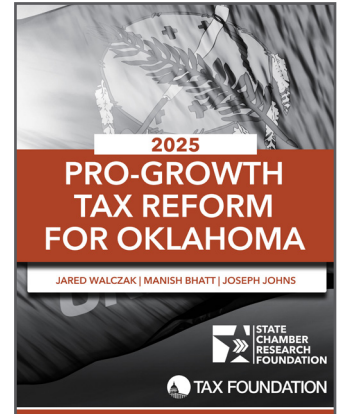
Changes to Oklahoma’s legal landscape have increased uncertainty and costs for employers, prompting growing concern within the business community about the state’s competitiveness. In 2025, the State Chamber Research Foundation and The Perryman Group

conducted a study that found excessive tort costs are significantly harming Oklahoma’s economy, reducing annual gross product by \$3.7 billion and nearly 32,000 jobs, with cumulative losses from 2020 to 2023 totaling \$14.9 billion in gross product and 128,500 job years. The 2019 removal of caps on noneconomic damages was identified as a key contributor to these losses, along with declining tax revenues to state and local governments. The study concludes that excess tort costs weaken Oklahoma’s ability to attract and retain businesses, resulting in long-term economic and workforce losses that threaten the state’s future growth and prosperity.

## TAX STUDY★

Also in 2025, the State Chamber Research Foundation partnered with the Tax Foundation to outline strategies for strengthening Oklahoma’s tax competitiveness to support long-term economic growth. The coalition updated a study first released in 2021, that compares tax systems nationwide and provides updated recommendations focused on structural reforms to

individual and corporate income taxes, sales taxes, and property taxes. While noting recent progress—such as eliminating the franchise tax, making full expensing permanent, and removing the marriage penalty—the report emphasizes that continued reform is needed as other states advance similar efforts. Key recommendations include considering a flat or single-rate individual income tax, repealing the corporate “throwback rule,” and pursuing strategic rate reductions to attract investment, enhance economic stability, and position Oklahoma for sustained growth in an increasingly competitive environment.



## LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD★

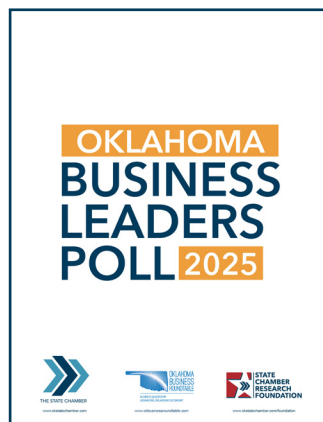
The State Chamber is encouraged by the voting records and actions of Oklahoma’s senators and representatives. Collectively, the Legislature earned a 73% pro-growth score. Seven lawmakers had a perfect 100% score on the Legislative Scorecard in 2025, supporting bills that will lead to a more business-friendly environment for Oklahoma businesses and opposing those that are not pro-growth. Thirty-eight legislators received scores of 90% or better on this year’s Prosperity Tracker, receiving an “A” grade.

## BUSINESSES LEADERS POLL★

The 2025 Oklahoma Business Leaders Poll showed strong optimism across the state’s business community. Seventy percent of respondents said Oklahoma is on the right track, and 88% plan to increase investment in their companies.

Conducted annually by the State Chamber, the Oklahoma Business Roundtable, and the State Chamber Research Foundation, the survey gathered input from more than 300 business owners and executives statewide. For the fourth consecutive year, workforce availability ranked as the top concern, even as confidence in Oklahoma’s economic direction remained high.

Respondents also expressed strong support for investments that drive long-term growth, including improved health outcomes, infrastructure investment over personal income tax cuts, and targeted efforts to market Oklahoma to attract talent. Taken together, the results reflect a clear view among business leaders that sustained workforce development is essential to the state’s competitiveness and economic future.



indicators tied to the state’s competitiveness and growth.

At the core of the app is the Legislative Scorecard, which evaluates each state legislator’s votes and actions on bills affecting business, job creation, and economic development. Grades are issued at the conclusion of each legislative session, continuing more than 25 years of the State Chamber Research Foundation’s pro-growth voting analysis.

Beyond the scorecard, the Prosperity Tracker allows users to monitor pro-growth and anti-growth legislation across policy areas such as workforce development, taxes, health care, insurance, and energy. The platform also offers real-time vote tracking, lifetime pro-growth scores for elected officials, and a dashboard of vital economic data to help users better understand Oklahoma’s policy and economic landscape.



In 2025, the State Chamber Research Foundation launched the Prosperity Tracker, a new app that modernizes the organization’s long-running tracking of pro-growth policymaking at the Oklahoma State Capitol. Formerly known as the RIED Report, the initiative now provides Oklahomans with an interactive tool to follow legislators’ voting records alongside key economic



## PROSPERITY SUMMIT ★



SCRF held its 15th Leadership Exchange Academy in 2025, bringing together Oklahoma’s best business experts and top political minds. The two-part summit was held over the span of four days in June and July for the purpose of connecting civic-minded professionals with state government and business leaders. LEA is

a tremendous learning opportunity for individuals interested in public policy as well as professionals seeking to learn more about how the state government helps facilitate business development. Hundreds of professionals from across Oklahoma applied to be part of LEA’s 2025 cohort, but only 38 were selected. Participants engaged in educational conferences and programing to exchange ideas and learn about good government practices, the public policy process, and free enterprise.



The State Chamber Research Foundation, in partnership with the Oklahoma Technology Alliance, hosted its second annual Prosperity Summit in the fall of 2025. The event brought together business leaders, educators, innovators, and policymakers. Speakers and participants examined the impact of artificial intelligence on Oklahoma’s economy, education system, and workforce development.



The Summit featured expert discussions on AI’s evolution and future potential, a keynote address by Hart Brown, CEO of Future Point of View, on unlocking business value and navigating adoption challenges, interactive AI demonstrations, insights into the state’s technology industry, and an education and workforce panel focused on advancing opportunity—underscoring Oklahoma’s commitment to leveraging emerging technologies to drive growth, competitiveness, and long-term prosperity.

# MEMBERSHIP

The State Chamber experienced steady membership growth, engagement and retention of members this year. With a retention rate over 93%, this reflects strong member satisfaction and continued confidence in our advocacy, policy leadership, and statewide impact on behalf of Oklahoma employers. Our members continue to remain actively engaged in advancing pro-business policies and strengthening the state's economic competitiveness.

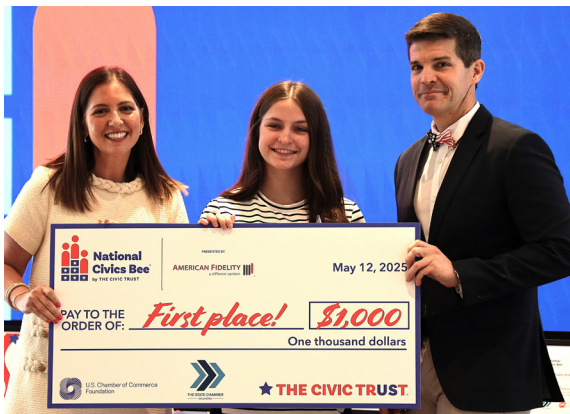

Available at OkDecides.com, the website tracks federal, statewide, and state legislative races, keeping voters informed of both confirmed and emerging candidacies throughout the election cycle. By consolidating election information in one accessible location, Oklahoma Decides helps Oklahomans better understand who is seeking office and stay current on key developments shaping the state's political landscape.

The platform provides detailed coverage of federal and statewide races, while in-depth state legislative race information is exclusively available to members of The State Chamber's 2300 Club. By offering timely, credible insights into who is on the ballot and who may enter the race, Oklahoma Decides equips voters with the knowledge they need to make informed decisions that will help shape Oklahoma's future.
